A Year of Pivots, Prayer and a Pandemic

Like the rest of the country, Palmer Home was thrown a curveball in March 2020 with the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. But in our line of work, shutting down wasn't a possibility. We still had children to care for, families to serve, caregivers to recruit and funds to raise. The question was: how could we do it all safely and effectively?

Our priority is always the safety and wellbeing of the children in our care and our employees. "At the beginning of the pandemic, we took swift action to protect their health: we enacted quarantines, suspended visits with outside guests and enabled remote work for certain employees. We prayed constantly. We exercised the utmost caution while still allowing the children to play, learn and have fun," says our President & CEO Drake Bassett.

Since the pandemic unfolded, we have welcomed several new children, including sets of siblings, into our care. We welcomed home our Transitional Care students who were affected by the closure of college dormitories. We also provided support for needs like diapers and groceries to our Foster Care families and Family Care biological parents who lost their jobs as a direct result of COVID-19.

To recruit new potential caregivers, we began hosting interest meetings virtually via Zoom. We had no idea what to expect - it was the first time we'd ever hosted interest meetings in this format - but each meeting attracted more and more potential caregiver couples.

The pandemic presented new challenges to fundraising as well. Traditionally, our most successful events are large, in-person gatherings filled with food and fellowship. Completely canceling our events - which raise vital funds for our mission - would have drastically impacted our presence in the community. But how could we host them safely? Would sponsors even want to be a part?

Thanks to God's grace, the creativity of our team, and our tremendous partners, we were able to press on with our signature events. The events featured the same amazing cuisine and packages as before, but with a socially distanced twist. Instead of hosting in-person gatherings, the tickets included to-go coolers so supporters could share the meal with family. "We hope to gather again soon, but this year taught us that we are able to successfully pivot and come up with creative strategies instead of cancelling outright," says Bassett.

"Since our doors opened in 1895, we've overcome many crises, from World Wars to the Great Depression to the pandemic of 1918. In fact, many children found their way to Palmer Home as a result of these historic trials," he adds.

As the past has taught us, we anticipate COVID-19 will result in an influx of children needing a place to call home. Many families across our nation were already on the brink of personal disaster - living paycheck to paycheck, overcome by alcohol or drug abuse or facing the consequences of past decisions. Unfortunately, during the stresses and losses inflicted by this pandemic, many of these fragile situations will crumble.

"Palmer Home stands ready to help. God's hand is steady, and, with His providence, ours will be as well," says Bassett.

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Kevin's Story: A Beautiful Picture of Our New Model of Care

As you may remember, in 2019 we made a historic decision to expand our care settings to include Family Care, Foster Care and Transitional Care. This development not only allows Palmer Home to serve more children and families, but also means we can provide an expanded scope of care that evolves with each child's needs. While each care setting is unique, they all include loving caregivers, dedicated case managers, and the stability and consistency children have come to trust from Palmer Home.

"Our ultimate goal at Palmer
Home is and always has been to
provide a safe home for children
in need," says Anna Brooke
Warren, Palmer Home's Vice
President of Children's Services.

"Our new model of care propels our mission forward by allowing us to serve more children and serve them better. It's designed to be flexible and responsive to each child's unique needs, whether the child is a toddler in need of an emergency placement or a 21-year-old trying to navigate adulthood."

Most children who arrive at Palmer Home are placed in a cottage on our campus staffed by loving houseparents. A permanency plan is created for each child; research shows that children thrive best when transitioned into

smaller, secure family units such as our certified foster families, or ideally, back to their own biological family. If reunification with the biological family is not possible, our certified foster parents welcome the child into their home as a new member of their family.

Once the children in our care turn age 18, they progress to Transitional Care if they have not yet been placed with a certified foster family. We operate one transitional home for young men and another for young women, and similar to the campus cottages, both are equipped with houseparents and case managers. While in Transitional Care, the young adults learn the skills necessary to lead healthy, independent lives.

A beautiful picture of our new model of care is the story of Kevin. Like many children, when Kevin first came to Palmer Home, he was placed on our campus. He blossomed in the loving, supportive care of his houseparents and adapted well to life in his cottage with his houseparents and siblings. When he turned 18 years old, he progressed to Transitional Care and moved into the men's transitional home. A high school senior. Kevin decided he wanted to earn extra income and soon found a part-time job. Our dedicated staff was there every step of the way,

helping him learn important, "grown up" skills such as budgeting, saving and balancing the demands of work and school.

After a few months, we received a call from potential foster parents who had a heart for fostering an older child. It was clear right away that Kevin was a great fit for their family. He has now been in their family for several months and is absolutely thriving.

"He's a totally different young man than he was when he first came to Palmer Home," says Warren. "He is completely at home with his new foster family and has a newfound confidence in himself."

Kevin is stepping into the man God created him to be. His foster parents are his biggest cheerleaders, and he is succeeding in academics, athletics and at work.

It's because of your generous support that stories of life-changing transformation like Kevin's are possible. We are excited about this new chapter in Palmer Home's history and know that the Lord is using our ministry to lead incredible changes in the lives of vulnerable children.
