2022 was a record-breaking year for Palmer Home. Overall, we served more than 330 children, from newborns to young adults, across our four service lines. I thank you for your continued support of our mission to care for and share the love of Christ to children and families in need.

I'm writing this letter from the Dr. Hugh Francis, Jr. Wellness Center, the state-of-the-art facility on our campus we were able to open in May completely debt-free. It's difficult to convey the impact a building can have on our ministry; the Wellness Center is much more than walls and a roof.

For the first time, children can meet with their therapists without leaving campus; family members can connect for private, secure visitations; the children and caregivers can gather in a large indoor space for fun and fellowship; and we can host events like our cherished annual Awards Night (photo right). Healing takes place in this building, and where healing happens, hope grows. We know the Wellness Center will be a blessing to children at Palmer Home for generations to come, and we thank you for making it possible.

In this report, you'll learn about even more ways you helped bring hope to children at Palmer Home this year. Your support equipped us to welcome several children - including sets of siblings - out of emergency situations and into our care. We were able to come alongside young men and women and help them enroll in college, enlist in the military, and pursue a trade - forging new paths that will change their trajectory.

Children live on campus in a Christ-centered family atmosphere connected to trustworthy adults and supported as they grow and develop.




Infants of mothers in prison receive nurturing care with the goal of reunification. Staff and caregivers also offer support for mothers in prison and after release.




Children receive support and the connection of a family through Palmer Home's certified foster families.

whole child initiative

Children with a history of trauma have unique physical, emotional, social, educational, and spiritual needs that must be addressed before they can heal, grow, and thrive. Whole Child Initiative, Palmer Home's proprietary approach to care, is designed to help vulnerable children overcome trauma so they can flourish in home, school, and community life.

Whole Child Initiative does this through our four core principles:











When a child arrives at Palmer Home, we first seek to understand their Whole Story. We know that the child has likely experienced trauma and may have acute health and academic needs after years of instability. After a thorough assessment, our dedicated case managers create a plan to serve the Whole Child - an individualized plan of care that will serve the child's unique physical, emotional, social, educational, and spiritual needs. The child's Whole Team - their caregivers, therapists, teachers, coaches, and anyone else they're in relationship with - are part of the care plan. We know this work can be demanding on our team, which is why Palmer Home supports the Whole Caregiver through a variety of benefits and support services.

Part of what makes our approach to care unique is that we seek to maintain relationships with a child's biological family members when it's safe and healthy to do so. In addition to regular communication, family members also receive a "report card" each month detailing a child's growth while in our care. The report cards help families feel informed and connected, and it's encouraging to see a child's progress throughout the year.



JOHNNA SPEAKS AT CAFO SUMMIT

Christian Alliance for Orphans (CAFO) hosts an annual summit for thousands of leaders from around the world who serve orphans and vulnerable children. Attendees include pastors, church staff, leaders of nonprofit organizations, adoptive/foster parents and child welfare professionals. Recently, one of the moms we serve through our Family Care Ministry was invited to speak at the Summit and share her experience with Palmer Home. Johnna shared her testimony and the story of her pregnancy with her baby Journey Faith while incarcerated, and how Palmer Home Family Care served her before, during and after her sentence. Here is her story:

"My name is Johnna and I wanted to share that I did not have an easy childhood. As a young adult, I abused drugs and got in trouble with the law. I found God and prayed to Him to help me turn my life around, and by His grace, He did. I became clean, stayed out of trouble and started down a new path.

But my past choices came back to haunt me, and I was arrested and sentenced to prison soon after I found out I was pregnant. I was devastated.

Being pregnant in prison is terrible. There's no pink or blue, no baby showers, no celebrations. The larger my belly grew, the more panicked I became. Who was going to take care of my baby while I finished my sentence? What was going to happen to us? I continually cried out to God for help.

One day when I was at my lowest point,

another inmate overheard my fears and told me about Palmer Home for Children. She said they provided families for babies born to mothers in prison until the mom was able to care for her child. God was answering my prayers.

As the weeks passed, I got to know Susan, the Palmer Home Family Care director, and the Fields, the family that would care for my baby. They were all so kind and understanding, I knew God hand-picked them for my baby.

By the grace of God, I delivered a healthy girl named Journey Faith. Having to return to my prison cell after 24 hours was heartbreaking, but knowing my baby girl was in the care of a loving family gave me strength. They brought her to see me every week, mailed me pictures and let us 'talk' over the phone. They made sure our bond was growing. Every encounter gave me hope for the day we'd be together again.

Fast forward to today: I've been released from prison and reunited with Journey for five years. Susan and the Fields are still part of our lives; we consider them an amazing extended family. Words can't describe how grateful I am."

"I tell everyone that when they support Palmer Home, they're helping change lives like mine and Journey's. Through Palmer Home, God took my mess and made it into a miracle! I can't thank Him enough for answering my prayers."

DR. HUGH FRANCIS, JR. **WELLNESS CENTER**

The Dr. Hugh Francis, Jr. Wellness Center is a 25,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility that welcomes all to Palmer Home.

With classrooms, counseling suites, therapy rooms and recreational areas, the wellness center provides a space for hope and healing in accordance with our Whole Child Initiative. It also serves as a space for community gatherings and events that engage the public without compromising the privacy or security of the children in our care.

For the first time, children can meet with their therapists for counseling appointments without having to leave campus. Private visitation rooms allow families to strengthen biological bonds, and state-ofthe-art classrooms are equipped for tutoring sessions and remote learning alike.

The children are most excited to finally have an indoor, full-court There's also a large, multipurpose indoor gathering space, outdoor patios, a commercial kitchen, a board room and administrative offices for Palmer Home staff.
