

HEAR FROM ONE OF OUR ALUMNI

"From my earliest memories, Palmer Home was far more than a shelter; it was the foundation of our childhood. My brother Clayton was about two and a half years old, and I was around eighteen months when we arrived.

Palmer Home gave us more than we could have imagined—a sense of belonging, stability, and faith. We grew up surrounded by a large extended family of other children whose parents were also struggling. We ate meals together, went to church, attended Vacation Bible School, and spent our days outdoors, at summer camps, and playing sports. We grew up brave and responsible comeback kids who gave back to our community and other charities.

The values I learned at Palmer Home—gratitude, faith, and perseverance—have guided our entire lives. I know that Clayton and I, like many of our Palmer Home brothers and sisters, could have grown up in foster care, been separated from one another and from family, and not been given the opportunity to thrive. Instead, Palmer Home gave us the gift of a Christian home, loving houseparents, stability, education, hope, and prayer. It provided a place to heal from the scars of trauma and to grow into successful, independent adults, spouses, and parents.

WHY WE EXIST— AND KEEP SHOWING UP

MORE THAN 343,000 CHILDREN ARE IN FOSTER CARE IN THE U.S.¹

In Mississippi, that number is around 4,000.² Many children experience repeated placements and long waits for stability.

Our Campus Care program provides a stable home for children during seasons of uncertainty. Whether a child is on the path to reunification or foster care, we surround them with trusted adults and a safe environment where healing and growth can happen.

OVER 23,000 YOUTH AGE OUT OF FOSTER CARE EACH YEAR WITHOUT PERMANENT FAMILIES.³

Youth who age out face substantially higher risks of homelessness, incarceration, and poverty.

Our Transition Program partners with young adults as they grow into independence - emotionally, spiritually, and socially. Not all 18-year-olds are equipped to take on full adult responsibilities. So, we remain close and continue coaching life skills towards sustainable independence.

EACH YEAR, ABOUT 2,000 INFANTS ARE BORN TO INCARCERATED WOMEN.⁴

Within 24 hours of birth, many of these women must place their child with relatives or in the foster care system.

Our Family Care Program connects caregiver families with both mother and child, preserving connection, promoting stability, and offering a new path forward.

ADOPTIONS FROM FOSTER CARE HAVE DROPPED 24% SINCE 2019.⁵

In a system where too many children are left waiting, we remain a place of safety and continuity, helping each child move toward a safe and permanent home.

At Palmer Home, we believe every child deserves to feel safe, loved, and supported—for as long as it takes. Whether we're walking with a child for a season or for years, our commitment is the same: meet their needs, build trust, and offer hope that lasts.



PALMER HOME'S STORY STRETCHES ACROSS 130 YEARS OF AMERICAN LIFE.

We began in the late 19th century, when William States Jacobs called upon his church to form a refuge for children with nowhere else to go. Through pandemics, economic upheavals, and social change, our mission weathered each season by adapting—adding cottages, shifting campuses, and building new ways to support education and daily life. Generations of staff, supporters, and friends shaped that evolution. Our scope has widened, but our mission remains the same. From year 1 to year 130, we show up for children.

CAMPUS CARE: ACADEMIC SUPPORT THAT CHANGES OUTCOMES

At Palmer Home, children receive personalized academic support, emotional care, and opportunities to thrive academically and socially. Whether they attend Palmer School or a school system in the community, we show up for them—in the classroom, at parent-teacher nights, and throughout the school system—as advocates for their success.

HELPING STUDENTS CATCH UP AND MOVE FORWARD

Many children arrive at Palmer Home having missed years of consistent education. Some can't read or write their names.

One eight-year-old child came to Palmer Home unable to read, write, or do basic math.

Through our small class sizes and personalized instruction, that student caught up and discovered a gift for math. Today, he is thriving at grade level and eager to keep learning.

His story is an example of what's possible when children receive the care and tools they need to grow and learn. Our holistic model of learning helps students recover lost academic ground and successfully transition to traditional school environments.

EQUIPPING STUDENTS THROUGH WHOLE CHILD INITIATIVE

Many children arrive on campus behind in school, often because of disruptions outside of their control. That's why Palmer Home uses **Whole Child Initiative** as the foundation for care.

It's a trauma-informed framework designed to meet each child's needs across five areas of development: emotional, physical, social, academic, and spiritual. This approach allows us to address the root causes of challenges like academic delays. It changes the question from, "**How can we get this child to perform?**" to "**What support does this child need to grow?**"

ACADEMIC GROWTH WITH PERSONAL SUPPORT

Whole Child Initiative guides staff and caregivers to consider daily routines, sleep quality, relational safety, and even spiritual formation. A child struggling to concentrate may not need harder coursework. They may need consistency, encouragement, and time to rebuild trust in the learning process.

Palmer Home staff uses Whole Child Initiative to create individualized academic plans. Instead of a one-size-fits-all curriculum, each student receives targeted support. Progress isn't just measured by test scores. It's seen in increased confidence and engagement.

LEARNING BEYOND THE CLASSROOM: FIELD EXPERIENCES

Healing and growth often extend beyond academics. **Field experiences are an opportunity for children at Palmer Home to practice social skills, reinforce classroom learning, and have fun.**

Our students have explored places that many had never experienced before.



They visited the **Bob Tyler Fish Hatchery in Enid**, where they learned about Mississippi's aquatic resources and discovered the joy of fishing.



Kids traveled to Idaho for the **On River Time** trip, where days on the water and time with mentors offered a chance to reflect, recharge, and grow.



At **Miss Hippie Eats in Hernando**, they measured ingredients to bake chocolate chip cookies—an exercise in math that ended with one child asking to take their cookies back to the cottage, so they could share what they made with everybody.

Children have also attended the Memphis Ballet's *The Nutcracker* at The Orpheum, Theater Memphis' *A Christmas Carol*, and toured the Walls Fire Station to see firsthand how firefighters and EMTs serve others.

Each experience is designed to support our children's development, as well as expose them to new possibilities for their future when it comes to careers, post-secondary academics, and healthy recreational activities.



ARE YOU INTERESTED IN BECOMING A MENTOR?

- Must be at least 25 years old and a resident of their state for at least 12 months.
- Provides encouragement, practical support, and healthy modeling through consistent interactions and shared experiences.

FOSTER CARE: MENTORSHIP THAT CHANGES THE TRAJECTORY

Mentorship provides a chance for children at Palmer Home to build trust with adults who offer emotional support, guidance, and a steady presence in their lives.

Palmer Home mentors can be individuals or families who partner with the full-time caregivers to support children facing challenges like family instability or trauma. The relationship typically begins with short-term visits to get to know the child.

Over time, some mentors may choose to become licensed foster families if they're well-matched and the child's needs make it appropriate. Others remain trusted mentors, offering consistency and care in a child's life without becoming foster parents.

FROM WEEKEND VISITS TO FAMILY: TRANSITIONING FROM MENTOR TO FOSTER CAREGIVER

Maya's journey with Palmer Home is one example of how mentorship can grow into something even more life-changing. She began spending weekends with a mentor family, gradually building trust and a sense of belonging. Lately, that family chose to foster her, offering the stability and everyday care she needed. While their time together in this new chapter is still new, the early signs are encouraging, showing how consistent support and the right opportunity can open the door to new possibilities for a child's future.

PROVIDING SAFETY AND STABILITY THROUGH FOSTER CARE

Palmer Home's foster care program places children in carefully matched families where they can experience dependable relationships and steady routines. These placements are built through extensive planning and consistent support for the child and the foster family.

Our program is rooted in the belief that every child is created with purpose and value. We connect children to families who reflect that truth through consistent care.

Foster parents are trained and supported to be able to meet practical needs, but more importantly, the emotional and spiritual needs that help children feel safe and seen.

HOW THE PALMER HOME FOSTER CARE PROGRAM WORKS

Families start by completing the SAFE (Structured Analysis Family Evaluation) Home Study, a nationally recognized assessment tool. The assessment includes interviews, background checks, and a comprehensive review of the potential home environment to ensure every placement meets safety and readiness standards. Once approved, many families begin as mentors and then transition to full-time foster parents.

Foster families partner with our case managers to not only meet the child's educational and developmental needs but also monitor their progress and emotional well-being. **Ongoing training and check-ins provide families with support throughout the process.**

STRENGTHENING CHILDREN THROUGH CHURCH PARTNERSHIPS

Palmer Home was born out of the church's heart for mission—and that legacy continues today. When congregations pray, serve, and share, children experience steady care and a circle of belonging. Church partners help nurture kids on campus, support teens in transitional care, encourage foster and mentor families, and surround caregivers with practical love. Together, we turn compassion into consistent presence.

YOUR CHURCH CAN PARTNER WITH PALMER HOME

Some churches host interest meetings or training sessions for potential foster families. Others build support teams around active foster homes to provide meals, childcare, or encouragement. Many choose to sponsor events or collect offering donations. Consistent prayer for the children and the families supporting them is also important.

TRANSITIONAL CARE: GUIDING YOUNG ADULTS TO INDEPENDENCE

Palmer Home's Transitional Care program supports young people 18–24 years old who are transitioning from campus or foster care to independent living.

HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS: PROVIDING TOOLS FOR THE TRANSITION

Palmer Home offers support in these areas:


- Housing support and help with educational or job-related costs
- Training in household management and time prioritization
- Case managers and mentors help navigate career decisions and personal challenges

WHY TRANSITIONAL CARE IS IMPORTANT

Young people who are aging out of foster care are at an increased risk of facing challenges such as homelessness, unemployment, and emotional distress. Our program offers structure and resources to help reduce those risks.

WAYS YOU CAN SUPPORT THE TRANSITION

You can help young adults take their next steps with confidence. Financial gifts strengthen the support they receive as they pursue independence through housing, education, and career opportunities. Volunteers can share practical skills by leading workshops on budgeting, job prep, or meal planning. Local employers can open doors by offering internships, job shadowing, or work opportunities.

PREPARED FOR THE ROAD AHEAD HAYDEN

When Hayden came to Palmer Home as a teenager, life had already asked a lot of him. He was used to carrying more than his share of responsibility and had learned to get by with limited support. He also faced hearing difficulties that made it hard to hear the people around him. Palmer Home offered stability, care, and access to the medical support he needed to better manage his hearing.

He found a place with us where he could finally slow down, feel safe, and focus on his own future.

With love and structure, Hayden began to grow into confidence. He graduated high school, explored new interests, and set new goals that once felt out of reach, including a career that would let him give back to others. Through it all, the consistency of Palmer Home helped him build stronger relationships and see what stability could really look like.

Now a young adult, Hayden has become someone others can rely on. He helps where it's needed, brings calm to his surroundings, and takes pride in creating a sense of home wherever he is.

For Hayden, independence doesn't mean going it alone. It means carrying forward the lessons, relationships, and belief in himself that will always connect him to Palmer Home.

FAMILY CARE: RESTORING FAMILIES THROUGH COMPASSION

Palmer Home's Family Care program offers a structured, faith-led alternative for infants born to mothers facing incarceration or enrolled in residential recovery programs.

The program has been operating in Nashville since 2007. **Palmer Home connects each child with a certified volunteer caregiver who provides care while keeping the parent-child relationship intact through regular visits, photos, and open communication.**

Unlike state custody arrangements, these placements are voluntary. The mother retains custody and agrees to partner with us to maintain a connection with her child while completing her sentence or treatment.

Many placements originate through word of mouth among incarcerated or recovering mothers who've seen the impact firsthand and choose to request support.

The program also supports mothers through parenting classes, counseling, spiritual care, and community referrals. Over time, it has expanded to partner with recovery programs, drug courts, and transitional programs across Middle Tennessee.

WHY FAMILY CARE WORKS

- Reduces trauma for children by avoiding state custody
- Helps mothers stay emotionally connected during treatment or incarceration
- Encourages long-term family stability and spiritual restoration

HELPING A MOTHER AND DAUGHTER REUNITE

JOEL, TRACY, AND ROBYN'S STORY

While Robyn was serving time in prison, she discovered she was expecting her daughter, Aalayah. Robyn faced a difficult choice: Who would care for her baby while she worked toward a second chance?

Through Palmer Home's Family Care program in Nashville, Robyn was introduced to Joel and Tracy, a volunteer family who had prepared for years to serve mothers and children in vulnerable situations.

"THIS PROGRAM IS THE GOSPEL IN ACTION," JOEL SAID. "NOT JUST CARING FOR THE BABY, BUT FOR THE MOM AS WELL."

A PERFECTLY TIMED MATCH

In August 2021, just five days before Aalayah's birth, Robyn was matched with Joel and Tracy who became Aalayah's caregivers while Robyn remained connected through visits, photos, and eventually weekend stays through a prison visitation program.

"THEY MADE ME FEEL LIKE I HAD SOMEBODY THERE," ROBYN SAID. "THE SUPPORT OPENED DOORS I NEVER THOUGHT WOULD OPEN."

THE ROAD TO REUNIFICATION

That support continued after Robyn's release in 2022. Joel and Tracy made sure Aalayah spent consistent time with her mother, meeting regularly as Robyn was rebuilding her life. In February 2025, Robyn and Aalayah moved in with Joel and Tracy when challenges with work and childcare became difficult for Robyn on her own.

Living with Joel and Tracy has given Robyn space to grow into motherhood with confidence. She remembers early on being nervous about routines like bedtime. With Tracy's encouragement, "You're her mom. You can sing her anything," Robyn has stepped fully into her role. She has continued to make progress toward independence, while Aalayah is surrounded by love from her mother and the caregivers who stood by them.

DISCOVERY CAMP: PREPARING KIDS FOR WHAT'S NEXT

We believe every child deserves the tools and confidence to imagine a full future. Discovery Camp is a weeklong college and career readiness program designed to help our youth do just that.

Each summer, middle and high school students spend four days immersed in practical, hands-on experiences that expose them to career paths, life skills, and personal development tools they've likely never encountered before. The week is intentionally designed to be informative and fun.

WHAT THE WEEK LOOKS LIKE

Team Building and Life Skills: From escape rooms and ropes courses to practical classes like how to clean and maintain a home, the week kicks off with activities that build trust, accountability, and independence.

Business and Industry Field Trips: Students visit local businesses such as car dealerships, credit unions, or culinary schools, where they see real jobs in action and meet professionals across multiple industries.

Career and College Fair: Students choose their fields of interest and rotate through small group sessions with professionals like architects, barbers, police officers, social workers, and chefs. These sessions help students understand career paths and improve their interpersonal communication. Colleges also visit campus to share information about admissions and programs.

Vision Planning and Celebration: The week ends with presentations, vision boards, and guest speakers who share stories of perseverance and purpose. Our guests have included entrepreneurs, law enforcement leaders, and former foster youth who now lead in their fields.

WHY DISCOVERY CAMP MATTERS

Many of the children at Palmer Home have never visited a college campus, spoken to a professional in a field they admire, or even considered life beyond age 18. Discovery Camp bridges that gap with exposure, encouragement, and practical next steps.

Students leave the week inspired, more self-aware, and with a stronger sense of direction. Some even begin preparing for ACTs or exploring trade schools for the first time.



We celebrated academic perseverance and progress at our awards banquet at the end of the school year. We honored students' hard work, including our Presidential Award recipient!






